MEMORABILIA VALUES (continued from last month)

Ticket Stubbs have increased in popularity, especially as they are a dying item owing to fans purchasing tickets online. For example, Middlesbrough v City FA Cup 3rd Round replay, the stub price was £5.99 and the original ticket price was £18.00. City v Manchester Utd, December 2009, stub price £3.99 and the original ticket price was £32.50. Other tickets are available with prices ranging from £1.99 to £3.99.



Picture cards are an interesting area and the Memorabilia Team is currently working on 700 cards that will eventually be shown on our website. Originally cards were given away with cigarettes. The first appeared in the 1880s with a packet manufactured by WD & HO Wills. By 1900 300 companies worldwide were producing cards for many different sports. With a lot of emphasis on American sports. Later cards appeared in bubble gum packets, newspapers and in recent years they developed into an item of their own with Panini and Topps Match Attax producing sets for International Tournaments, club squads by seasons, International players, etc. Sticker Albums are produced and collectors are encouraged to buy and swap cards, which all encourage the value to rise. These cards are often referred to as Trading Cards.

A card featuring the 1970/71 Hull City team produced by The Star Football Swap Card Collection is currently for sale for £1.00. Whereas a 1959 card of Ferenc Puskas is on eBay for £95,000. One can also see the following cards for sale on the internet. A Panini card from 1978 featuring the City team is on sale for £3.00. A Daily Herald card from the 1950s featuring Neil Franklin is on at £4.00 and a Clifford card of Raich Carter in his Tigers kit is on at £22.00.

Cards featuring City players from the 1930s and 20s are still available and I found a number for sale. Cards produced by Pinnace featuring the following players are on sale at £2.99 each.

The players are, S Cheetham, D McKinney, H Sargeant, J Collier, G Morrall. H Slater and T Bleakley.

I have yet to research other items such as shirts but I am aware the collection of match-worn shirts is a popular item for collectors. It increases its value if it is unwashed, autographed or from an important game. With clubs now producing 3 different designs a year it has increased the number available but the values remain quite high.
