Memorable Cup games

Three weeks ago I attended the FA Cup 2nd Qualifying Round cup tie between Tadcaster Albion and Chester FC. When not watching Hull City I can be seen at Tadcaster. Taddy are 3 tiers below Chester and the attendance of 777 was 4 times greater than their average. The game was also shown on BBC which added extra spice and attention to the game. On returning home I watched parts of it on the iPlayer. Further interest was that the co-commentator was Alex Bruce and he told of his experience in the 2014 Cup Final along with clips from the game. It got me thinking about **memorable cup games** I have seen in my 70 years of supporting the Tigers and the various competitions they have been involved in.

So, let's look back over the club's 119 years and pick out which games may have been memorable to the fans at that time. The FA Cup is obviously the one that catches the imagination and the competition we all look forward to. Unfortunately, we have never won a major cup, the best so far are Semi-Finalists in 1929-30 and 2013-14 and Finalists in the same year when we lost 3-2 to Arsenal aet. Other notable achievements are Football League Semi Finalists in 2016-17 (Lost 3-2 on aggregate to Manchester United). FA Trophy Runners up 1983-84 (lost 2-1 in the final to Bournemouth at Boothferry Park). Watney Cup Runners up 1973 (lost to Stoke City at Stoke 2-0). Football League Full Members Cup Northern Final finalist (lost to Manchester City over 2 legs 3-2). We have of course had a venture into Europe in the UEFA Europa League losing on the away goals rule against KSC Lokeren from Belgium.

In the FA Cup, we made our first appearance on 17 September 1904 when we drew 3-3 away at Stockton. Unfortunately, the replay had to be played in Stockton and City lost 4-1. The first home tie was played in October 1905, at the Circle, with the Tigers winning handsomely 8-1. This led us to be drawn against Denaby United and a unique situation occurred as the club was required to play 2 games on the same day, 28th October 1905, and the authorities would not allow either of the games to be postponed, City won the cup tie at Denaby 2-0 but lost a league game at the Boulevard 0-1 against Manchester United in front of 12000 fans. In the following tie City beat Leeds City 2-1 in a replay.

The following few years saw us play some top names, in 1907 we lost to Spurs in a second replay. In 1908 City drew 0-0 at Woolwich Arsenal and won the replay ay Anlaby Road 4-1 in front of a crowd of 16000. In 1909 we lost to Chelsea in a replay in London, we were also beaten by Chelsea in 1910 and Newcastle away 3-2 in 1911. In the next few years, nothing of note happened and WWI intervened in football.

In the 1920-21 season, the Tigers hit the headlines when they played Burnley from the First Division. Burnley were on a long unbeaten run spanning 20 games when they visited Anlaby Road and in front of 26000. City won 3-0 with goals from Tom Brandon (2) and Henry Wilson. The Daily Mirror reported the game as follows, "Wonders will never cease in the Football Cup, Burnley after holding an unbeaten certificate since the early days of September were unceremoniously routed and ousted from further interest in the English Cup ties by lowly placed Second Leaguers at Hull. Such results add to the charm and produce the disease known as Cup Fever among lovers of "Soccer", especially those who follow the fortunes of the professional clubs." Don't you just love the way the press reported football over 100 years ago? Burnley was gracious in defeat and presented the match ball to City with a plaque commemorating the great win. City still has the ball and you will be able to view it shortly in the Match Souvenirs section of the Memorabilia Gallery.



The next tie of note was in the 4th Round in 1927. The Tigers were still in the 2nd Division and drew 1-1 with First Division Everton at Anlaby Road, the reply was also drawn, 2-2 and a third game at the neutral venue of Villa Park was won 3-2. City went on to lose the 5th Round tie at Wolves 1-0.

3 years later the impossible happened **when City reached their first FA Cup Semi Final**. Having disposed of Plymouth, Blackpool, Manchester City and Newcastle they came up against the mighty Arsenal at Elland Road. 47549 witnessed a 2-2 draw. In the replay at Villa Park in front of 46200, the Tigers lost 1-0 but it was hailed as a creditable performance from a team that 2 months later would be relegated to the Third Division North. (*turn to page 4 to see the covers for both those 1930 Semi-finals*) It would also be 84 years before the feat was repeated when Steve Bruce led out the Tigers at Wembley in 2014 to play Sheffield United.

Another unspectacular footballing period followed, including the intervention of WW2 but in 1949 City hosted the game many of our parents talked about and one or two of you will have attended. The 6th Round home tie against Manchester United. Raich Carter and colleagues had got the area in a frenzy with their performance in the league and cup. A record attendance at Boothferry Park (BP) of 55019 witnessed a 0-1 defeat but it was a day still talked about today. You can see pictures and read about the great season in the Tiger Mags that are on our website.

1953-4 saw us get as far as the 5th Round and a tie at BP against Spurs. A 1-1 draw in front of 46879 was followed by a replay in London which City lost 2-0 in front of another large attendance of 53936.

We now enter a time when I started to watch the Tigers and clearly remember being among the 24155 crowd at BP to see City win 2-1 against York City in 1956. Brian Bulless scored both goals. I recall cup games having a special atmosphere and buying a rosette in North Road. In 1958 City were drawn away at Sheffield Wednesday in the 4th Round. It was to be my first away game at a First Division ground but on arrival in a wet and grey Sheffield with my Dad and a couple of his friends we were greeted by the news that the game was cancelled owing to a waterlogged pitch Not to be outdone and miss a game we swiftly moved to Rotherham to see them take on Grimsby but that was also called off. Our game was played on Wednesday 29 January, under lights in front of 51834. Sadly, I was not there but City played well and lost 4-3 with goals from Stephens, Bulless and Bradbury. If City had won, they would have played in the dramatic first game for Manchester United following the Munich air crash.

1960-61 saw City play in a remarkable 2nd Round tie with Darlington. The tie took 5 games to settle with City eventually winning. The sequence of games was, Darlington away - drew 1-1 (Price), replay at Hull - drew 1-1 (Chilton), 2nd replay at Elland Road - drew 1-1 (Price), 3rd replay at Belle Vue Doncaster – drew 0-0 and finally the 4th replay at Ayresome Park Middlesbrough – won 3-0 (Clarke, Gubbins and king). The reward was a home tie against First Division Bolton Wanderers which was drawn 0-0 followed by a 5-1 defeat in the replay.

This has turned out to be an interesting and extensive subject and will be continued at a future date
